We have also been blessed with opportunities to engage in change-making projects for peace and reconciliation, for early childhood development training and for mentoring and supporting small business owners. ❖ COVID-19 and the 3rd Building Better Businesses Symposium

We had planned a 3rd Symposium to be held in September 2020, which became impossible once COVID-19 hit. The South African organizing committee is now planning a 3rd Symposium for March 2021, either virtually or in person, as pandemic circumstances permit. South Africa has the highest number of COVID-19 cases and deaths on the African continent. As elsewhere, it has restricted movement outside homes and required physical distancing. These moves have resulted in a dramatic decline in household incomes, hitting low-skilled less-educated workers the hardest. COVID-19 has pushed many households into positions of food insecurity due to the severe shock of lost income. A recent UN Development Program report predicts that GDP will take at least 5 years to recover.

♦ 100th Anniversary of Rotary in Africa in 2021: 100 Mediators Project

Next April marks Rotary's 100th Anniversary in Africa. Rotarians plan to celebrate this milestone by training 100 community mediators to participate in dispute resolution as a legacy for Rotary's next 100 years in Africa. The Townships Project is proud to participate in this project that will support townships entrepreneurs and to encourage Canadian Rotary Clubs to participate as well. The mediators will be:

- independent from court-mandated mediators, which are often inaccessible to underprivileged groups
- community leaders of under-represented groups, such as youth, women, micro-business owners and peace activists
- accredited by Mediators Beyond Borders International (MBBI)
- trained by a Rotary Vocational Training Team (VTT) in collaboration with the Africa Centre for Constructive Resolution of Disputes (ACCORD) and Unisa's Institute for Dispute Resolution in Africa (IDRA). UNISA stands for the University of South Africa.

Early Childhood Development (ECD) Training and Certification in Soweto

We are providing funding to an ECD program, to be led by Rotary in Soweto in 2021, which will train and certify women who already run Townships daycares. This work is foundational to building healthy communities for the future.
